## Message from the President

We are now at the mid-point in the year between the AAASS meeting in Washington, D.C., at which we enjoyed numerous interesting panels put on by ESSA members, and the next AAASS meeting in New Orleans in the fall of 2007. Our proposed panels are in (I trust) and I look forward to seeing all of you once again in the Big Easy.

Last fall many of you, and some Slavists who are not ESSA members, recommended that ESSA sponsor panels on things medieval at the 43<sup>rd</sup> International Congress on Medieval Studies, 8-11 May 2008. It will take place at Western Michigan University, Kalamazoo, Michigan. I have made inquiries and it is possible to sponsor as many panels as we can put together for this and future congresses. **THE DEADLINE TO SUBMIT SPONSORED-PANEL PROPOSALS TO KALAMAZOO IS 15 MAY 2007**, which means that they must come to me at the address listed below in time for me to provide ESSA endorsement and then submit them. But the congress requires that proposals be submitted on paper (not by e-mail). Slavists, who are not yet members of ESSA, may certainly participate, but they must become members to do so. It is easy. Send me annual dues of \$10.00 along with a short curriculum vitae. I hope we can make a good showing there. Those congresses are truly international, stimulating and a lot of fun.

I am pleased to tell you that Robert Romanchuk (Dept. of Modern Languages, Florida State Univ.) has agreed to head up a nominating committee to present us with a slate of officers (V-P President elect, Secretary-Treasurer, and Newsletter Editor) at our fall meeting. George Majeska, our present vice-president will then take over as president and (fortunately, Isolde Thyrêt and Christian Raffensperger have agreed to continue on as secretary-treasurer and newsletter editor).

### **Minutes of the ESSA Meeting in Washington, D.C., 2006**

After David Miller opened the meeting the Treasurer's Report was read by Christian Raffensperger, for Isolde Thyrêt, and was accepted by the membership. David Miller then introduced Francis Butler, the chair of the awards committee, to present the ESSA award. The 2006 award was presented to Simon Franklin for his book, *Writing, Society, and Culture in Early Rus', c. 950-1300*. (Cambridge, 2002). The committee will next be chaired by Russell Martin, and the award topic will be for works on or editions of early Slavic texts published during the period 2005-2007 [see the announcement in this newsletter]. Francis Butler also asked for the membership's input on the issue of inclusion of electronic media in these awards. After a lively discussion, David Miller instructed the awards committee to discuss the issue of adding a fourth award for electronic media. Marina Svoboda was also elected to fill out the empty seat on the awards committee for next year.

David Miller next opened for discussion the possibility of the ESSA becoming a sponsoring organization at the International Congress on Medieval Studies held annually in Kalamazoo, MI. David Prestel read a letter from Julia Verkholtantsev in support of ESSA sponsorship at Kalamazoo as a means of recruiting a wider membership, and the topic was well-received by the membership. David Miller agreed to contact the Medieval Institute and arrange sponsorship for the 2008 Kalamazoo Congress.

The next item on the Agenda was the Announcements. George Majeska announced our dinner plans upon the conclusion of the Annual Meeting. Sandra Levy thanked David Birnbaum for his continued hosting of the ESSA website. She also raised the issue of uses of the website [an issue of which we discussed other aspects in 2005]. It was decided, after a great deal of discussion, to delete the current membership directory online since it is outdated. David Miller then announced the ESSA-sponsored panel on "Medieval Slavic Electronic Text Resources," organized by David Birnbaum. Proposals would also be accepted for ESSA sponsorship for the 2007 AAASS. David Miller also announced the creation of a nominating committee for a new slate of officers which will be announced and voted upon at the 2007 Annual Meeting.

There was then a variety of New Business announcements. Monica White, Secretary/Treasurer for the Slavonic and East European Mediaeval Studies Group, brought greetings from across the pond, and announced that anyone interested is welcome to present at their March/November meetings. The publication of a Festschrift in honor of Norman W. Ingham was announced by Christian Raffensperger. Donald Ostrowski announced changes for the ASEC business meeting. George Majeska raised the question of having too much money in our treasury because of our non-profit status. Various solutions are offered, including coffee and Danish at the Annual Meeting, and it was decided that we will raise the amount of our award to \$100 for 2007. Meeting adjourns.

### **Second Biennial Association for the Study of Eastern Christian History and Culture Conference and Call for Papers**

The Association for the Study of Eastern Christian History and Culture, Inc. (ASEC) announces its second biennial conference to take place in Columbus, Ohio October 5-6, 2007, and is pleased to invite papers for its multi-disciplinary conference on the theme "Centers and Peripheries: Interaction and Exchange in the Social, Cultural, Historical, and Regional Situations of Eastern Christianity."

Papers may deal with any historical period or with contemporary issues and come from all disciplines including anthropology, cultural studies, history, literary criticism, linguistics, sociology and religious studies. The conference aims to explore the interactions between and among different religiously-defined communities within the Eastern Christian traditions, and the interactions and exchange between Eastern Christian communities and other religious groups and traditions.

Conference sessions will be held at the Blackwell Hotel and Conference Center with accommodations at the nearby Holiday Inn on the Lane. The conference will include two days of panels plus a keynote address. Panel proposals of three presenters plus chair/discussant are preferred but individual papers are also encouraged. Please send panel and paper proposals with abstracts of 100-200 words for each paper, and a short c.v for each participant to Russell Martin (martinre@westminster.edu). Proposals must be received by May 31, 2007.

Registration is \$40 and participants must be members of ASEC, Inc. by the time of the conference. Fees are waived for students and faculty of The Ohio State University with current university identification. Dues are a mere \$10 per annum (\$5 for graduate students); dues (made out to ASEC Inc.) for 2006 and 2007 may be sent to Lucien Frary, Rider University, 2083 Lawrence Rd., Lawrenceville, NJ 08648.

### **Early Slavic Studies Association Distinguished Scholarship Award**

The EARLY SLAVIC STUDIES ASSOCIATION (ESSA) is pleased to announce that at its meeting on November 16, 2006, the annual ESSA Distinguished Scholarship Award was presented to Simon Franklin for his book *Writing, Society and Culture in Early Rus, c. 950-1300* (Cambridge University Press, 2002). A work of extraordinary erudition and methodological innovation, the book was awarded the prize in the category of "research in Early Slavic studies that applies concepts or methodologies that are broad, innovative, or not commonly used in the field."

### **Call for Nominations: 2007 Early Slavic Studies Association Distinguished Scholarship Award**

The EARLY SLAVIC STUDIES ASSOCIATION (ESSA) invites nominations for the annual Distinguished Scholarship Award. The prize is awarded each year to a book or seminal article in one of three areas, in rotation: (a) early Slavic texts (analysis, edition, and/or translation); (b) work in areas outside Early Slavic studies that integrates our members' research and reflects understanding of the continuing significant connections or parallels between early Slavic culture and other cultures; (c) research in Early Slavic studies that applies concepts or methodologies that are broad, innovative, or not commonly used in the field. The 2007 Award will be given for works on or editions of early Slavic texts published during the period 2005-2007. Works nominated may be published in any country, and the authors do not necessarily need to be ESSA members.

The deadline for nominations is May 30, 2007. Nominations should be sent to Russell E. Martin, chair, ESSA Distinguished Scholarship Award Committee, martinre@westminster.edu. Self-nominations are permitted.

### ***Polata Knigopisnaia* Adopts Peer Review, Issues Call for Papers**

*Polata Knigopisnaia*, an international journal of Early Slavic books, texts, and literatures, is the only Western serial focused primarily on the study of Early Slavic manuscripts and material texts. Since publication began in 1978 it has maintained a rigorously high level of quality; from 2006 it has been available exclusively on-line at the Knowledge Bank at The Ohio State University: <<https://kb.osu.edu/dspace/handle/1811/6399>>.

The new editors of *Polata Knigopisnaia*, Cristiano Diddi of the University of Salerno, M. A. Johnson of the Hilandar Research Library at The Ohio State University, and Robert Romanchuk of Florida State University, have adopted an editorial-board peer review system for contributions from 2007 forward. All contributions that the editors consider to fit the scope and criteria of *PK* will be reviewed anonymously by two members of the editorial board.

The editors of *Polata Knigopisnaia* are issuing a call for papers to appear in vol. 38 (2007). *PK* publishes scholarly articles, editions, indexes, and bibliographical and review essays related to Early Slavic texts, manuscripts, and early printed books, and their historical and cultural contexts.

Authors considering submitting an article are encouraged to contact an editor to discuss length and subject matter, and to obtain a style sheet.

- The first of a 3-volume critical edition of *Kniga stepennaia tsarskogo rodosloviia* under the general editorship of N. N. Pokrovskii and Gail

Lenhoff (*Iazyki slavianskoi kul'tury*) has now appeared in print and can be ordered through your regular supplier. Volume I contains the first ten "steps" of the primary text, as well as a preface describing the hands and features of the base manuscripts (23 pp.); a scholarly description of 145 known manuscripts (64 pp.); 3) an essay on the book's historical conception (30 pp.); an essay on the book's ideology and audience (24 pp.). Volume II -currently in press- contains the remainder of the text ("steps" 11-17), the appendices (Iona Dumin's redaction of Aleksandr Nevskii's Life, Metropolitan Aleksii's miracles), and a detailed index. Volume III, still in preparation, provides detailed historical and literary commentary (in Russian). Generous support and encouragement were supplied by the National Council for Eurasian and East European Research, the National Endowment for the Humanities, IREX, UCLA's Center for Medieval and Renaissance Studies, UCLA's Dean of the Humanities and the Russian Humanitarian State Fund. Special thanks go to Profs. Edward L. Keenan and Janet Martin, who wrote letters of support to the granting agencies, and to Lina S. Mikhelson (Moscow-Los Angeles), the senior Russian editor for the commentary. An international conference on "Stepennaia kniga tsarskogo rodosloviia: the Medieval and Early Context," sponsored by UCLA's Center for Medieval and Renaissance Studies is currently being organized for February of 2009.
