Greetings, ESSA members,

Once again we are anticipating the annual meetings of AAASS and ESSA. It appears that despite the change in the dates of the meetings from November to early December with the result that some of our members will be unable to attend, Early Slavic Studies will be well represented. I regret Robert's departure and on behalf of the entire ESSA extend our deep gratitude to him for performing this task so well for so long.

Finally, ESSA will be holding its annual banquet for members, family, and friends. Many thanks to Vice President David Miller, who has overseen the arrangements for this event. An announcement containing details about the dinner is below. David will also provide those details at our meeting.

I look forward to seeing many of you at the panel sessions, our meeting, and at the ESSA banquet. Until then, I extend my best wishes to you all.

Call for Contributions for Volume on Russian History

Foundations of History: Medieval Russia, 860-1725 will be produced in 2005 by Pegasus Press, an academic press devoted to providing faculty and students of medieval and Renaissance studies with texts and supplementary works that will enhance teaching and learning.

This new compilation is intended as a diverse and thorough collection of texts on medieval Russian history, which can be used in undergraduate as well as graduate classes. To be produced in print -- and possibly electronic -- form, the sourcebook will cover the broad ranges of political, economic, social, and cultural development. There will be no restriction on subject matter within the area of medieval Russia.

Original translations of primary documents are requested. While length will not be a determining factor, the editors reserve the right to edit the selections. The project is being directed by Eve Levin, associate professor of Russian history at the University of Kansas and editor of *The Russian Review*; and by Karen Lemiski (Ph.D. Arizona State University), whose research interests are focused on the relations between medieval Russia and the Byzantine Empire.
